It has been an absolute honor to serve as President of The Junior League of Spokane for the 2017-2018 league year. Not only am I amazed by all of the support I've received but also how much we've been able to accomplish!

Shortly after accepting the President's gavel, I introduced the theme for 2017-2018, "Growing Our Future." My goal was that we'd work



together to grow our revenues through fundraising and grant writing, grow our reach in the community through our Impact projects and book fairs, grow our brand recognition throughout our community, grow our membership numbers and member involvement but most importantly, grow as individuals.

I am happy to report that 2017-2018 was full of growth:

Touch a Truck was the most successful to date, bringing in \$10,500 record Net Income, 2,190 attendees and 32 trucks! Red Hot Night's 2nd year was a success bringing in Net Income of \$22,000 and Funding Resource Management dazzled us with creative money making opportunities while bringing in more than \$2,000.

I've also seen our members change formation during the year by: leading trainings, sharing valuable knowledge, double placing and going the extra mile to help a friend.


It's time for me to fall back in formation and make room for new leadership. Thank you for giving me wings. You're in good hands!

Voting Delegates were busy at this year's Annual Business Meeting held during AJLI's 96th Annual Conference in Memphis. After two years of collaboration, the Junior Leagues approved our Association Values. The Treasure Hunt Book Fair program has doubled in size in its second year! On April 14, we welcomed about 300 people to the gym at West Central Community Center, which we transformed into a colorful pirate's cove. Children and their parents visited the many literacy activity booths and informational tables, including the ever-popular "Not a Box" booth. After completing their treasure map by visiting all the activity booths, the children were invited to choose any book they wanted from a treasure chest of fun new books, which came from the JLS Book Bank library. All of the attendees also received a healthy lunch! The feedback from the parents and our community partners was universally positive, and this event is poised to grow substantially in the coming years.

In addition to the large event at West Central Community Center in April, we held a smaller fair in partnership with the Martin Luther King Jr. Family Outreach Center at their new location in the East Central neighborhood. Typically new events take a few years to grow as the neighborhood gets to know us, but we had a strong showing for the first year. All the kids left with two brand new books, and every attendee, including family members, received healthy snacks. The MLK Center is excited to partner with us again.
